

# ALOHA HAWAII

## HAWAII

The Hawaiian Islands were discovered by Capt. Cook in 1778, and there he met his death on his second visit in 1779. King Kamehameha brought the islands under one rule in 1791. The rule of his dynasty, which became a constitutional monarchy in 1840, ended when a revolution drove Queen Liliuakalani from the throne in 1893. An attempt to secure annexation to the United States failing, a republic was proclaimed July 4, 1894. On the outbreak of the Spanish-American War a treaty of annexation was negotiated, ratified by the Hawaiian Senate, and consummated by a joint resolution of Congress, July 7, 1898. Hawaii was created a Territory, an integral part of the United States, and its government provided for by the organic act of April 30, 1900.

The chief executive officer of Hawaii is the Governor, who is appointed by the President with the approval of the Senate for a four-year term, and who must be a resident of the islands in order to be eligible for appointment. The Territorial Secretary is appointed in the same manner, but the heads of the Territorial departments are appointed by the Governor, with the approval of the Territorial Senate.

The Legislature of Hawaii consists of the Senate of 15 members, elected for four-year terms; and the House of Representatives of 30 members, elected for two-year terms. The Delegate to Congress is elected every two years, and has floor privileges in the house, but no vote.

Honolulu, on the island of Oahu, is the capital and chief commercial city and port of the islands. It has a fine natural harbor.

Honolulu was discovered by Capt. Brown in November, 1794. Its chief building is the former royal palace, now the executive building. Be sure to see the museum with its many relics of early Hawaiian history. In it, the chief object of interest is the great feather war cloak of Kame-

## POINTS OF INTEREST

**ACADEMY OF ARTS**—Exhibits of Hawaiian and Oriental art. Open free to the public: Thursday 1000-2100; Friday and Saturday 1000-1700; Sunday 1500-1800.

**ALOHA TOWER**—Foot of Fort Street. Open 0900-1900 daily. Take elevator to 4th floor for free pass, then to observation platform.

**AQUARIUM** — Kapiolani Park. Open 1000-1700 daily; Sunday 1400-1700. Remarkable collection of brightly colored and queerly shaped fish. Admission 25c.

**ARCHIVES** — Territorial Archives, located in Iolani Palace grounds, open daily except Saturday afternoons and Sundays. A wealth of documents and relics of historic interest.

**BISHOP MUSEUM**—Kamehameha School grounds, open daily 1000-1600 except Sundays, 1400-1700. Finest collection of Hawaiian and Polynesian curios, relics and historical specimens. Admission free.

**CAPITOL**—Palace Square. Formerly the Royal Palace. Contains historical paintings and Throne room.

**FISH MARKETS** — Various displays of fish, sea foods and Hawaiian food products in general.

**GOVERNMENT NURSERY** — Keeaumoku and King Sts. Interesting assortment of tropical trees.

**HAWAIIAN VILLAGE**—Kalakaua Ave. between Moana Hotel and Kapiolani Park. The Lalani Hawaiian Village is an authentic representation of community life in Old Hawaii. Hawaiian entertainments and Native feasts (luaus) are held regularly.

**KAMEHAMEHA STATUE** — In front of Judiciary Building opposite Capitol.

**KAPIOLANI PARK** — Polo field, tennis courts, zoo, public baths, and Aquarium.

**KAWAIAHAO CHURCH**—Kawaiahao Church Yard, corner King and Punchbowl Streets.

**LIBRARY OF HAWAII**—King and Punchbowl Sts. Free public library, reading room, reference department, mainland papers. Open 0900-2100,

## RECREATION AND LIBERTY
