GOVERNMENT DISABILITY BENEFITS

The question frequently arises of what disability benefits accrue to Service personnel who are medically surveyed from active peace-time service under the present pension law. Below is given a summary of pension allowances for disability resulting from personal injury or disease contracted in line of duty or the aggravation of pre-existing injury or disease contracted or suffered in line of duty-if and when the disability, or aggravation of a pre-existing injury, or disability, is of a degree of 19 per cent or more. The monthly rates are as follows:

(a) If and while the disability is rated 10 per centum the monthly pension shall be \$6.00.

JAPANESE TRAINING SQUADRON VISITS AMERICAN PORTS.

This past week the Japanese Navy Training Suadron consisting of the Yakumo (Flagship) and the Iwate. under the command of Vice Admiral Zengo Yoshida, arrived in Seattle. This is the first point of call of a series of American ports consisting of San Francisco, Los Angeles, Baltimore and New York to be visited by the Squadron. Other foreign ports to be visited by our Nippon friends include Balboa. Colon, Havana, Manzanillo and Honolulu. The Squadron is due to arrive in San Francisco 14 July, and in Los Angeles 20 July. Continuing from there it will pass through the Panama Canal and thence up the East Coast. On its homeward journey it will stop in Honolulu 14 October.
